Dear Friends, when did you last visit our beautiful churchyard? Last week, I spent a happy hour or so wandering along the specially-mown path through the long grasses. I really enjoyed spending time looking at the abundance of daisies, white campions, buttercups and different varieties of grasses. The churchyard has been under a management system for about ten years, developing areas of meadow, margins of wildflowers and nettle patches. There is an abundance of insect and birdlife, and a recent bat survey has noted that bats are present and active here too. Last Summer, we were awarded a bronze award by the Cambridgeshire Wildlife Trust in recognition of our work in promoting biodiversity. We are currently looking at other improvements to the church and its surroundings to encourage more wildlife.

Looking ahead, we are planning to spend time outdoors worshipping God in nature, with Forest Church being planned for an Autumn launch. Forest Church is a short, family friendly service suitable for all ages, and we plan to meet every fourth Sunday afternoon, from 3-4pm, in the churchyard. Keep an eye out for more details in the next issue! We are blessed to be living in such a beautiful corner of the world, and as the summer progresses, with longer and hopefully warmer days, I pray that we may all have the opportunity to connect with God outdoors. For each journey, passengers pay £3.50 for a local journey and for longer trips, 30p per mile is charged, (calculated from start of journey at the driver's door to the end of journey, at the driver's door). Please pay by cash, our drivers cannot accept card payment.

The Scheme is run entirely by a dedicated team of local volunteer drivers and co-ordinators, kindly offering their services to help those in need of transport.

For all drivers, mileage costs are reimbursed at 45p per mile, part paid by the passenger and a subsidy from Cambridgeshire County Council.



The Book Group reads


MY BRILLIANT FRIEND Elena Ferrante

n June, the group met to review the book My Brilliant Friend by Elena Ferrante. The story, set in the 1950s, clearly depicts the lives of the two friends Elena and Lila growing up in a poor neighbourhood near Naples and experiencing much violence during their childhood and adolescence. Very few children received education beyond primary school but both girls are very bright and Elena, being more diligent than Lila, is encouraged by one of her teachers to study and through education escape the restricted, impoverished life which otherwise awaits. Lila however, is more rebellious and although she is largely self taught and easily picks up the basic skills, the teachers do not encourage her in the same way. As a result their paths diverge when they reach secondary school age. Elena has to fight for her place at school, convincing her parents that it is worth her continuing with her education but Lila joins her father's shoe business demonstrating entrepreneurial spirit at a young age by designing new types of shoes which she dreams will make them rich. She and her brother Rino make a prototype which attracts much interest but which enrages her father and for a long time he refuses to accept their ideas.

While Elena continues with her studies, in most years achieving top marks in all subjects, Lila attracts the attention of most of the local young men, including Marcello Solara, the young son of the local Mafia leader. Despite being pressured by her family to marry Marcello, Lila resists because she considers the Solaras to be fundamentally evil. To escape Marcello, she accepts Stefano Carracci. Stefano seems to appreciate Lila's originality, by buying the prototype pair of shoes, and thus convincing her father that her ideas are valuable. Lila and Stefano marry when she is just sixteen, throwing a large party to which they invite the whole neighbourhood. The novel ends with the arrival of Marcello Solara, who was invited against Lila's will, and who arrives wearing the shoes that she had made and that Stefano bought demonstrating some of the power plays amongst the local families.

Most of the group enjoyed this book and several have read all four books in the series. The group agreed that the relationship between the girls is very well described, in particular the way the girls' lives diverged and then converged showing the ways in which they needed each other in order to develop and succeed as individuals. The title of the book suggests Lila's acknowledgment of Lena's brilliance but throughout the book Lena tends to put herself down and would refer to Lila as the brilliant one. For Lila, without education the only route out of poverty was to marry, as is the case in many cultures, but in such a male dominated society as this finding the right partner was not easy.

However, not all of the group found this an enjoyable read and for some who had read it before it did not stand a second reading. Some of the



group were disappointed that the book covered a relatively short period of their lives, especially as the book begins with Lila's disappearance in her later life and to find out more there were three more books to read. The group did find it interesting that the story has two strong female characters as its focus who have drive and ambition to change their lives and escape poverty whilst being encased in a close knit, violent male dominated environment.

There is no meeting in July and August. The book group will reconvene in September to discuss The Island of Missing Trees by Zelig Shafak. Shortlisted for Women's Prize for Fiction in 2022 it is a story of love between two teenagers, a Greek Cypriot and a Turkish Cypriot, who meet at a taverna on the island they both call home.

Parish Council news for July

♦ The June Parish Council meeting was attended by a few residents and our District Councillors. As is usual, the minutes of the June meeting will be available after the July meeting. However, the following topics are likely to be of more interest to the village.

NMU (Non-Motorised User) Access - update As was the case at last month's meeting, there was nothing definite to report. Our County Councillor was unable to attend the meeting and sent her report with a covering email in which she stated once again that funding for the project had never been guaranteed. Cllr. Murphy included in her email a link to the agenda of a meeting on 19 January 2021 (Council and committee meetings - Cambridgeshire County Council > Meetings_ (cmis.uk.com). In the agenda is a reference to a document produced by National Highways entitled Highways England Non-Motorised User (NMU) Routes. This document contains the following:

Dry Drayton NMU link - With the completion of a new NMU link from Swavesey to Cambridge as part of the A14 project, Dry Drayton remains cut off from the network. A short link from the village to the NMU path would link Dry Drayton in to the wider network and give a route to Cambridge.

The document goes on to identify five schemes for which funding had been provided and which would start in January 2021. Dry Drayton was not included. There was a further statement:

A second round of scheme delivery is likely to follow in the next financial year and so it is possible that those schemes outstanding can be delivered through that process.

The next financial year has passed, we are no further forward with the project, and Dry Drayton remains cut off from the network. Other than being advised by our District Councillors that "things are happening in the background", information and updates on the project have ceased. Hence the recent intervention of Anthony Browne MP is timely, and I for one am very interested in what the response will be to his letter to Cllr. Lucy Nethsingha, Leader of Cambridgeshire County Council. A copy of the letter can be found on Anthony Browne's Facebook page, as well as on that of Dry Drayton, and is a result of the letters which residents of the village and I have sent to him.

Condition of the village roads and street furniture

Through his activities with the village Speedwatch team, Chris Turner was contacted by a stand-in Highways Officer. Chris was asked if we still require the additional MVAS poles (these are the poles on which the portable traffic speed sign is mounted around the village). We have been waiting for these for a few years, and Chris confirmed that the poles were still required. He also took the opportunity to ask the Highways Officer about the replacement of various missing or damaged bollards at the traffic calming chicanes and the roundabout by Park Lane/Oakington Road. I was delighted to hear that all the requests had been accepted, bar one, and that work would commence shortly. Our thanks to Chris for raising these matters.

East West Railway

I think that most in the village would have breathed a huge sigh of relief when they heard that EWR had selected the southern route for the approach to Cambridge. I would like to thank everyone who was involved in protesting against the possible Northern Route and its likely impact upon the village and our surroundings.

However, even though a decision has been made for the southern route, we must remember that this will be close to Dry Drayton, and the neighbouring parishes will be impacted significantly by the project. The business case for EWR depends in part upon housing developments along various parts of the route, including more than 53k people in Cambourne area (Table 4.2, Appendix 4 of EWR's recently published Economic and Technical Report). Cllr. Houlihan and I have been invited by the neighbouring parishes to join a meeting with Anthony Browne MP to discuss this further. This will be sometime after the drop-in meeting at the Cambridge Belfry Hotel in Cambourne (11 July, 2.00pm to 8.00pm) so that we can learn more. None of us wants North Cambourne to creep towards Dry Drayton over time and we shall do our utmost to retain the rural nature of Dry Drayton.

Ownership of the footpaths and bridleways

A question which I am often asked is who owns the public rights of way around the village. I asked this question of the Definitive Map Manager of Highways Service, Cambridgeshire County Council and was advised that all bridleways and footpaths are maintainable at public expense. Details of the various footpaths, etc. can be found at https://www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/ residents/libraries-leisure-culture/countryside-access/ rights-of-way.

However, Cllr. Smith had received a request for something to be done about the condition of Long Lane, the path which goes from Pettit's Lane to Oakington Road. The Lane is muddy, virtually impassable in wet weather and is certainly not accessible to anyone in a wheelchair. Cllr. Smith was advised by Highways that work was not necessary at this time and so the Parish Council is exploring other options, including setting up working parties at the end of the summer to tidy the footpaths in readiness for winter.

In my correspondence with Highways, I was advised that if there are any issues regarding the upkeep of Public Rights of Way, these should be reported using the CCC Online Tool at https://highwaysreporting.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/. This will ensure that the issue is recorded in their systems, allocated to the right person and tracked. The only way we might be able to get the footpaths cleared and maintained is for as many people as possible to use this tool to report rights of way which are in a poor condition.

Obviously, if a footpath or other right of way borders your property, it would be appreciated if hedges, etc. could be trimmed back to ensure that the pathway does not become overgrown.

Dry Drayton Parish Council

Last, but by no means least, and as I have asked for the past few months, if you want to contribute to what happens in Dry Drayton, there are still a couple of vacancies on the Parish Council. If you are interested, please let Sarah, our clerk, know.

Road Closures in July & August

Monday 3 - Wednesday 5 July: Scotland Road.

Scotland Road Dry Drayton will be closed between Hardwick Interchange and Scotland Farm between Monday 3 July and Wednesday 5th July for water connection work.

Diversions will be signed via Cambridge, but those with local knowledge or a satnav may well divert via Madingley, so beware of HGVs on the Dry Drayton to Madingley road. Although not planned, it's possible these works might extend beyond 5 July.

17 – 18 August, Park Lane

Park Lane will be closed by Duck End Farm on Thursday 17 – Friday 18 August.

Flooding improvements

The causes of long term flooding continue to be investigated. The County council is contacting the landowner in which is situated a large drain which takes water away from the village and which seems to have been untouched for years. Officers want to get permission to explore, jet out and if required repair this very large drain. It may help to reduce a great deal of regular flooding. If and when the officers have made contact with the owners, work investigating it will not be able to start until the autumn in any case as the entrance to the drain is covered with wildlife and nesting birds.

NMU link with Scotland Farm Travel Hub

We met with the project officer responsible for the delivery of the NMU route connecting the village with the proposed Scotland Farm Travel Hub. They discussed likely timescales and decided on a site visit in Dry Drayton where route options would be reviewed with the Parish Council and other stakeholders prior to a presentation and discussion at a later public meeting. Colleagues at GCP are currently in the process of investigating route options. We'll discuss the timing of meetings with the Parish Council and hope that many

people can participate in the discussions.

Luton flight path noise - note extended deadline

The Civil Aviation Authority has extended its period of data collection on flight path noise period until September 2023. Any concerned residents should continue to present reports of excessive noise together with as much detail as you can reasonably gather. The editor adds: Have you been disturbed by the increased numbers of aircraft flying overhead? This is because of the changes made last year to the flight paths of aircraft flying into Luton Airport. As our councillors say above, the Civil Aviation Authority is gathering data on the changes until September. If you are concerned by aircraft noise levels, please register your concerns.
