

The Book Group reads


DEATH AT LA FENICE DONNA LEON

'e met this month to review Death at La Fenice by Donna Leon. Set in Venice this follows the investigation into the death of Maestro Helmut Wellauer, a world-renowned conductor, who died from cyanide poisoning during an intermission at La Fenice. This is the first in an extensive series of novels by Donna Leon about Guido Brunetti the Vice-commissario of police in Venice, who she introduces in this novel.

Wellauer is portrayed as a moralistic character and prejudiced against gays. He reneged on a deal with the gay director to place a friend of his in a performance and also threatened to tell the lead soprano, Flavia Petrielli's ex-husband about her lesbian affair with American millionaire archaeologist Brett Lynch, so that Flavia's abusive ex-husband could gain custody of their children. Brett admits that Flavia saw the conductor during intermission and that they fought about the threats. Brunetti also learns that Wellauer may have been a Nazi and was definitely a womaniser. He hears about trouble with an elderly former opera singer, Clemenza Santina. He goes to see the singer, who is living in squalor, but she refuses to talk with him about the core of her hatred toward Wellauer. From his interview with a journalist, Brunetti discovers that Wellauer had indirectly caused the death of Clemenza's sister, who died from an illegal abortion. Brunetti also uncovers that Wellauer was distracted before his death, seemed estranged from his wife, and learned from doctors that he was going deaf. So there are a few suspects who would have had reason and opportunity to poison Wellauer but Brunetti discovers that the truth is more obscure.

The group agreed that this was an enjoyable and easy book to read, making it a pleasant contrast to our previous book. The opera theme was not to everyone's taste and some members found the book slow to develop as it lacks action. However, in this crime thriller, the death and its causes are secondary to the development of the characters. The group agreed that there are two main characters in this book, the first being the Brunetti family who are introduced in this novel and provide an interesting contrast between Guido Brunetti, a career detective and his wife, Paola, with her own significant family wealth and an academic career. The second character is Venice which is extremely well described with a geographer's feel for the townscape. The novel includes good anecdotes which those who had visited Venice could easily recognise.

Donna Leon has an extensive catalogue and some members of the group have read and enjoyed a number of her books. She



is an American academic who lives and works in Venice and perhaps for that reason there are a few americanisms which appear in the novel which some found jarring. The story was written around 1990 and the novel is very much of that time. Some members found that perhaps the later part of the book was over-edited as for them the ending was abrupt and lacked some context.

There is no meeting in December. At our January meeting we will review 'Cuddy' by Benjamin Myers. Cuddy tells the story of the hermit St. Cuthbert, unofficial patron saint of the North of England. The book covers several historical eras from the 8th century to contemporary England with, at its centre Durham Cathedral and the lives of those who live and work around this place of pilgrimage.

With the weather getting colder and communities spending more on heating, the District Council is beginning a new campaign to urge residents to make full use of assistance available. Research suggests that around 25% of some benefits go unclaimed.

- The Council is therefore encouraging residents to check they are claiming what they are legitimately entitled to (by visiting https://www.entitledto.co.uk/).
- The campaign also reminds people that local

foodbanks - all listed on the Council's website at https://www.scambs.gov.uk/foodbanks - are there when needed, and you don't need a voucher to use most of them.

News from the Parish Council

■ he November meeting of the Parish Council was relatively swift as whilst the agenda was quite full, none of the items took too long to cover. Hence this last piece of the year is somewhat shorter than previous reports.

There is nothing to report regarding either the Oakington Road or Scotland Farm NMUs (Non-Motorised User) Access or the Travel Hub, although it is hoped that there will be some news on the latter after the next December meeting.

Cambridge Road, Madingley

This topic was discussed during the open public forum, and the minutes of the November meeting will include Cllr. Granger's email and the reply from Clare Rankin as appendices. As mentioned in the previous report, we are not optimistic that any changes will be made to the scheme despite actions from some residents of Madingley.

Local Highways Improvement (LHI) application

The Parish Council has heard nothing further from Highways regarding the next steps of the planned introduction of the 40mph buffer zones and HGV weight advisory signage. This work will be funded through the Local Highways Improvement scheme with a contribution from the Parish Council.

The closing date for the next round of LHI applications is January 2024. Considering the outstanding work due with the current application, and the intended traffic calming work which will be funded through S106 funds received from the first development phase of Northstowe, it was decided that an application would not be made for 2024. It should be noted that the money from Northstowe phase 1 is being held by the County Council, not the Parish Council and will be made available once a traffic calming plan has been submitted. The options for further traffic calming will be discussed with our Traffic Liaison Officer and will take account of the results of the survey which was carried out over a year ago.

The next meetings of the Parish Council will be Tuesday 5 December and Tuesday 9 January, both at 19.00 in the Village Hall.

As Rachel is stepping down as editor of the Newsletter, I would like to thank her and her team for the sterling work they have done for more than six years to ensure that the Village Newsletter is received throughout Dry Drayton in a regular and timely manner.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a Happy Christmas and my best wishes for 2024.


